Tenses: all mixed up

Read the dialogue below and fill in the gaps using the correct tense and form of the verb (such as present simple, past progressive, past perfect, will-future). The answers are on page 3.

Ryan:	I know, sorry. But I (19) (still/not/buy)	you

Answers

- 1. Are you going shopping (present progressive)
- 2. I am (present simple)
- 3. was just wondering (past progressive)
- 4. suppose (present simple)
- 5. looks (present simple) *or* is looking (present progressive)
- 6. have been watching (present perfect progressive)
- 7. will make (will-future)
- 8. were (subjunctive, if-clause)
- 9. has probably been (present perfect simple)
- 10. has been using (present perfect progressive)
- 11. is (present simple)
- 12. spends (present simple)
- 13. has been (present perfect simple)
- 14. has been (present perfect simple)
- 15. have seen (present perfect simple)
- 16. hate (present simple)
- 17. never recovered (past simple)
- 18. is using (present progressive) *or* has been using (present perfect progressive)
- 19. am still not buying (present progressive) or am still not going to buy (going-to future)
- 20. will give (will-future)

Note: In direct speech and more informal language, you can also use short forms. In other words, you can shorten *I am* to *I'm*, *I will* to *I'll*, *I have* to *I've*, and so on – apart from in answer number 2.
